In generous support of the Blake's Cottage Appeal, internationally renowned Ruth Rosen entranced her audience at St. Mary's Church, Felpham on Saturday, 25<sup>th</sup> July with a solo performance of Man Without a Mask, her own selection of readings taken from the diverse work of poet, artist and visionary William Blake.

Ruth's voice moved effortlessly to contrast little known letters with the aphorisms Blake is renowned for: 'Prudence is a rich, ugly old maid courted by Incapacity.'
